



Make a connection to history: Researching Canadian soldiers


Whether you're using this guide before a history tour or in the classroom—our soldier pairing activity gives you the perfect opportunity to help students develop a personal connection to Canadian history.

Ready to get started? We've outlined every step.

Getting started

1. In order to verify the cemetery your group wishes to research, give your Tour Consultant a call at 1-800-387-1460. If there is a specific cemetery that you would like to visit, please speak with your Tour Consultant to identify whether this works with your current tour itinerary.
2. Once you've confirmed the cemetery you will be visiting, visit the [Commonwealth War Graves Commission website](#).
3. Use the 'Find a Cemetery' search field on the home page of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website, and type in the cemetery indicated by your Tour Consultant.
4. Click on the cemetery and research the history of the site and gather a list of soldiers buried there.
5. Work with your group to assign individual soldiers based on their interests.
6. Have each person research their assignment considering such questions as:
 - a) Where is this individual from? What is their story?
 - b) Why would someone in their position enlist in the military?
 - c) How would this service person's life be similar or different from yours?
7. On your tour, EF will work to include a visit to your assigned site* to provide an opportunity for you and your group to reflect. During this time, you may do a self-facilitated ceremony as a group or allow your group to explore the site individually.
